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
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a letter from the president

It's been quite a winter up here in the great white north. Our month long block classes have just arrived back on campus from far-away places such as the Galapagos Islands, Borneo, and Argentina. Some of our students have stayed a little closer to home with our Alaska based courses such as Dog Mushing 101 or Winter Wilderness Expedition. With the return of our students, our home campus has a new abundance of energy and excitement. The Residence Life Department is gearing up for an exciting NWACUHO conference right here in Anchorage. We are very excited for everyone to visit our wonderful city. At the same time we are preparing for our RA selection process, quality of life surveys, and the regular tasks associated with the spring.

Plans are underway to build a new student center here on APU's campus and we are looking forward to being involved in the design process. One of our goals is to have students involved in the building process which will be exciting. On the programming front, APU is hosting the third annual gaming convention and this year we are teaming up with UAA to have competitions between the two student bodies. In March, we are hosting a program entitled "Ladies Night" which is an event focused on women's health and wellness and will in-

clude a clothing drive for the local women's shelter. It's going to be amazing.

University of Alaska Anchorage

UAA has undergone several significant staffing changes during the last semester. Director of Residence Life Dawn Dooley has been promoted to be UAA's Associate Dean of Students, a new position created to oversee Student Judicial Services, Residence Life, and the Student Union and Commuter Student Services.

Michael Votava served as Associate Director of Residence Life through September 2008 when he transitioned to a new position at UAA as the Assistant Director of Student Judicial Services. UAA is excited to welcome Emily Boling from Oregon State University to be UAA's new Associate Director of Residence Life. Welcome Emily!

UAA has been busy working with Alaska Pacific University, the University of Alaska Southeast, and Tim Tullis to plan a fantastic 2009 conference in Anchorage. We are excited to welcome you to one of the most beautiful places on earth.

This fall, UAA has begun several academic initiatives. Alcohol violations in UAA's Residential Community have fallen to an eight year low. Likewise, other behavioral and mental health issues are significantly below average. On February 8, UAA Resi-

dence Life transferred over to using a new judicial database called JAMS, short for Judicial Affairs Management System.

University of Alaska Southeast

UAS has initiated a 5-year student apartment remodel rotation that will take units offline each semester to allow Facilities Services in for upkeep, repainting, carpet replacement, etc. The project began this semester and the initial 5-year rotation includes full replacement of all cabinetry and counter tops. The Housing Department is also planning to purchase new living room furniture and draperies to accompany the physical upgrades.

Enrollment at UAS dropped unexpectedly between the Fall and Spring Semesters, which unfortunately affected Student Housing as well. Numbers are down 11% from where we started in the Fall semester. This is also attributed to the permanent loss of 4 beds in off-site small housing unit and a higher number of evictions in the fall resulting from judicial cases involving marijuana use on campus than in years past.

Staffing was increased moderately with the addition of a full-time temporary Administrative Assistant and the extension of the Residence Hall Coordinator's appointment from an 11-month to a 12-month contract beginning next year.

University of Alberta, Augustana Campus

January brought the annual Rocky Road Ice Cream Fantasy; a fundraiser held in support of the Camrose and District Boys and Girls Club and the Camrose Food Bank. We had over 300 community members come out, play games, eat ice cream and enjoy our theme of Out of This World! An annual event held at the end of January, Rocky Road brings RAs, residents and members of the community together in support of local charities.

It's hard to believe that we're almost halfway through the winter semester at the Augustana Campus of the University of Alberta! While our students are gearing up for mid-terms, the Residence Life Department is excited to announce our senior student staff for the 2009-2010 year: Amanda Chytrcek, Gordon Naylor and Erika Heiberg. We're also getting ready for RA hiring, and to hire our Extra-Curricular Community Service Learning Coordinator; a new student staff position hired for the first time in 2008, that we're excited to continue.

Elsewhere on campus, the building of the library and student forum is still on-going, and renovations of one of our residence halls is about to commence! All of the construction on campus makes for a lot of mud, but it's exciting to see the progress as the buildings come along!

Red Deer College

Projects to improve Red Deer College are underway thanks to funding announced in early in the 2009 semester. Doug Sharp, Campus Manager at Red Deer College, has started working on upgrading ventilation systems in the welding and heavy tech-

nician shops. It will cost around \$1 million to do both and he expects the project will be finished this summer.

As well this summer RDC will also replace two boilers in the Arts Centre at a cost of \$100,000 and the high voltage electrical system throughout the college at a cost of around \$500,000. The Arts Centre roof will be replaced next spring and summer for around \$1 million or more. The funding was announced by the provincial government in September as part of \$155 million for colleges and universities around the province.

This past December, Red Deer College's Board of Governors announced that President Ron Woodward will be retiring in 2009. After 10 years leading RDC, Ron Woodward will step down as President and CEO. "Ron has been a strong leader for RDC and we are sad to see him leave but wish him well in his retirement. He has helped us to become Canada's leading comprehensive college serving the educational needs of our region," said Herb Der, Board of Governors Chair.

Ron was installed as RDC's 9th President in a ceremony held

on October 21, 1998. At that time, RDC had about 3,500 credit students. Today, we serve more than 6,500 credit students and 13,500 continuing education students. Our facilities have expanded and programming has diversified to keep pace with the changing needs of industry and our students. "It has been my sincere pleasure to serve as president of this great college," said Ron Woodward. "I have enjoyed my role and the opportunities it provided me to connect with the central Alberta community, and our staff and faculty. Most importantly, I've enjoyed the opportunity to work with our talented students and watch them as they have gone on to lead successful careers and successful lives."

Currently Residence operations, alongside a local engineering company, are beginning preliminary planning on the creation of a new entrance into Red Deer College that would run through an existing Residence building. The College is in need of another entrance, but as you can imagine this poses some complications in terms of re-locating the existing Residence building and conscientiously

converting green-space into a major roadway. The current talks are heading in the direction of uprooting the Residence building (a 4 unit rowhouse style building), splitting it in 2 and moving one section to sit adjacent to the proposed entrance and the other section to be moved across campus. This will prove an interesting undertaking that is scheduled to begin May 1, 2009.

On a final note from Alberta, I would like to thank everyone for these past 2 years on the board. It truly was a great experience, and I hope to return to it in the near future. That being said I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Natasha Lopeke from Mount Royal College as the incoming Alberta representative. I am very excited by Natasha's addition to the executive board. We will all benefit from Natasha's enthusiasm and care for this region.

RLPA

The Residence Life Professional Association (RLPA) recently reconvened (Nov. 13&14, 2008) at the University of Saskatchewan

for the annual fall business meeting. During the meeting portion of the 2 day gathering important items to note were: elections for 2 positions on the executive committee took place. Natasha Lopeke of Mount Royal College was elected as the new NWACUHO Alberta Representative and Angela Smith of Mount Royal College was elected as the RLPA Conference Chair Elect. The attendees engaged in a professional development seminar on the second day. Dr. Vera Pezer (UofS Chancellor) talked about the role of the Residence in the undergraduate student experience. This year's fall business meeting was a great success, and many thanks go out to the executive committee and to Sylvia, Mark, Eric and Ahmed for hosting. Heather Haskell hails from sunny Southern California where she received both her undergrad and graduate degrees (College Student Affairs) at Azusa Pacific University. Lindsey Mullens joins us from the Student Life department, after having the opportunity to work with several areas of the department, including student conduct, Housing & Residence Life, the Office of Parent Support, and New Student Orientation. Noreen Siddiqui comes to us having just finished her Master of Education degree at Iowa State University.

On September 9, the University held a dedication and open house for our newest residence hall—a 61,520 square-foot four-story 157 bed “green” facility. Gilbert Hall is undergoing its LEED Certification and we are confident that it will be awarded a Gold LEED status. This amazing structure represents the spirit of both the man whose name

it bears and the community and University it serves. A.C. Gilbert Hall is a testament to the dedication of this University and community to continue the tradition of providing opportunities for others to succeed. Western Washington University

Martin L. Reed is the new associate director of University Residences for facilities at Western Washington University. Martin took over Western's residential facilities portfolio in September 2008. Previously Martin worked at the Berkeley Student Cooperative and UC Irvine's housing program.

Edmonds Community College

This school year is a historic one for Edmonds Community College, as we will see the construction of a brand new student housing facility being built on campus. Named Rainier Place, this facility will boast state of the art amenities for students: including free Wi-Fi Internet connection, television hookups, a large student lounge/game room, a computer bar and an expansion of the RA team as well. Rainier Place is built with the students in mind, as it will offer single studios, 2-bedroom studios, 2-bedroom apartments and 4-bedroom apartments, with a total of 181 beds.

Groundbreaking was October 9th with completion scheduled for Summer 2009. A national search for a live-in professional, Coordinator of Residential Education (CRE), will begin in February 2009. This position will tend to the traditional jobs of hall director; supervision of RAs, campus-wide programming and overall management of the residential life program in the building. Gonzaga University

Spokane felt winter's fury just before break, with the final day of exams being cancelled due to record snowfalls of 24 inches in a day's time. Students had many troubles getting home, but the University responded well, serving what would have been the President's Christmas party dinner for faculty and staff to stranded students. Prime

rib and shrimp never looked so good! After surviving and digging out from record snowfalls in December and January, staff and students at GU are happy to be able to see sidewalks and even some brown grass again!

January has brought the beginning of both RA and RD recruitment and interview processes. Interview teams will be traveling to both the Placement Exchange and Oshkosh Placement Exchange to recruit for the estimated 3-5 Residence Director openings GU will have this year. Please contact Matt Lamsma or Jill Yashinsky if you or someone you know might be interested in these positions.

Residence Life is also proud of the expansion of both its ManTalk and WomanTalk programs. The ManTalk program is a facilitated discussion group that educates, supports, and challenges college men's attitudes, beliefs, and lives. Currently, in only its second year, ManTalk is facilitated in four residence halls and serves ap-

proximately 75-100 men each week. Survey feedback collected from participants, facilitators, and faculty/staff provided definitive evidence on the program's strengths and overall success.

WomanTalk developed just a year ago in only one hall, and has expanded to three more halls this spring. This program uses the same facilitated discussion process to allow college women an opportunity to reflect on their experiences, goals, beliefs, and futures. Spring semester will bring expansion and transition plans for these programs, as we hope both can be expanded in the upcoming year.

Construction also continues on our new 320 bed living learning facility, to be opened in August of this year. The building is taking shape quite nicely, with exterior brick work being done. We are crossing our fingers and praying for an on-time completion!

Washington State University

Greetings from the Palouse! Building seems to be the theme at WSU and has impacted our department in many positive ways. Our construction of a new residence hall is moving along and expected to be completed before Fall 2009. The 230-bed Olympia Avenue project is LEED Silver rated and will offer several innovative "green" features. Additionally, we are refurbishing Stephenson North and McEachern halls this summer.

Programmatically, we are "building" up our Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) program by moving it from Gannon-Goldsworthy hall to the Stephenson Complex. With 300 more bed spaces to accommodate students interested in the program, we continue to work with faculty and departments to meet their growing needs.

Our RA selection process continues to build upon the successful foundation from the past. We've received over 300 applicants for 120 positions, 150 of which are registered for the leadership class. With a healthy pool of returning staff, we anticipate continuing the trend of employing talented staff for next year.

Finally, we have 6 exiting Residential Education Directors with 3-4 years of professional experience who are "building" the field of Student Affairs. Sara Agostinelli, Jesse Andrews, Brandon Brackett, Bryon Burleigh, Kyle Cance, and Kate Gannon are on the job hunt so don't be surprised to see them at NASPA or maybe their resumes come across your desks.

Green River Update

Things are going well at the Campus Corner Apartments (CCA) at GRCC! The new Resident Council has been formed.
